Malheur Refuge provides crucial staging and breeding habitat for waterfowl migrating along the Pacific Flyway. The Refuge supports up to 66% of the Pacific Flyway total waterfowl population during migration.

To monitor this incredible abundance of ducks, geese and swans as efficiently as possible, biologists rely on aerial surveys to get a bird's eye view of the Refuge...[Read more here](#).

Benson Pond Work Party with Portland Audubon

From May 4-6, join volunteers with the Audubon Society of Portland at their first work party of 2018 at Malheur's Benson Pond. The Refuge conducted a prescribed burn on at Benson Pond this winter to renew the marsh and wet meadow habitat conditions at the site, and new plantings need to be installed along the berms and walking paths.

Controlled burns are a management tool to allow healthy growth and increased plant diversity that provides food, shelter and nesting material vital for birds to thrive. The fire has also provided an opportunity to refresh the shrub layer surrounding Benson Pond. For more details and how to sign to sign up, [go here](#).

Join Us for the Bobolink Survey!

On Saturday, June 9, in cooperation with Malheur National Wildlife Refuge staff, FOMR volunteers and field biologists from Portland Audubon survey for bobolinks on the Refuge. This survey, which dates back several decades at Malheur Refuge, involves walking established transect routes through wet meadow habitat, counting birds both seen and heard.
