The First Butterflies of Spring

With below-freezing temperatures occurring regularly at night, one doesn't expect to see many poikilothermic, or "cold-blooded", creatures out and about. But one resident poikilotherm that stirs to life on warmer days in early spring is, improbably, a butterfly: the mourning cloak (*Nymphalis antiopa*), a widespread species found across North America and Eurasia, is usually the first butterfly seen at Malheur Refuge each spring...Read more here.

Scrub Jays and Range Expansion

As natural landscapes give way to human development, many native bird species lose prime habitat or shift their ranges elsewhere (if they can). Some birds, however, seem able to take advantage of the changes and instead expand their normal range. Take California scrub jays, which have been pushing their range north and east for the past 40 years. Their arrival in southeast Oregon occurred recently, and it looks as though they're here to stay...Read more here.

If you are interested and not yet on the list, it's possible to join the wait list in the event that someone's plans change mid-stream. Volunteers with an RV or similar set-up are able to take advantage of the RV pads and amenities available at Refuge Headquarters.

Pollinator-palooza in 2019 - STILL NEEDED!

We are in the final stages of our long-awaited Pollinator Garden that will be going in the ground this spring! Volunteers can join us for one or both work party weekends:

April 13th & 14th - We will spend the weekend building and setting the raised garden beds for the Pollinator Garden. This will require light to medium physical ability and use of hand and power tools. Volunteers will have the opportunity to stay on site at the Refuge Fire Bunkhouse the nights of April 12th, 13th and 14th. This is a special treat, as lodging is a scarcity during the Annual Harney County Migratory Bird Festival! Sign-Up NOW!

May 4th & 5th - Finally, the plants will be planted! A weekend of gardening on behalf of the pollinators will include some light lifting, bending, squatting, etc. These plants will attract and support native pollinators and bring joy and exploration to Refuge visitors. Again, volunteers will have the chance to enjoy an overnight stay in the Fire Bunkhouse at Refuge HQ. Sign-Up NOW!
